Activity Overview

Palliative care necessitates a multifaceted approach involving healthcare providers from various disciplines. However, practice gaps persist, hindering the optimal delivery of care to palliative patients and their families.

Challenges include fragmented communication among healthcare providers, limited collaboration between different specialties, and inadequate understanding of the diverse needs of patients. Variations in prescribing practices, insufficient utilization of available guidelines, and a lack of systematic approaches of goalconcordant care further contribute to suboptimal outcomes. The underutilization of child life services can result in missed opportunities to address the unique emotional and developmental needs of pediatric patients and their families. Lastly, emotional burnout and compassion fatigue among healthcare staff may compromise the delivery of holistic care, further exacerbating these gaps.

This activity will provide an overview on the current palliative care guidelines and evidence-based prescribing practices; effective methods for enhancing communication and collaboration skills of team members; strategies for recognizing and managing emotional well-being and fostering resilience of the medical staff, and unique contributions child life specialists can bring to the care team.

- Describe a systematic approach to prescribing goalconcordant medications in serious illness
- Review safe and responsible opioid prescribing strategies in palliative care
- Define the role of the child life specialist in palliative care
