SPEAKERS



Governor Jim McGreevey, JD, M.Ed., MDiv, serves as Chairman, New Jersey Reentry Corporation, which provides critically needed services to persons returning from incarceration. Jim served as Executive Director, Jersey City Employment & Training Program, which manages "One-Stop" workforce training center. He led the women's counseling initiative at Hudson County Correctional Center. Having studied at General Theological Seminary, his field education was at Exodus Transitional Ministry, Harlem, New York City. Jim previously served as New Jersey Governor, State Legislator, and Mayor, Woodbridge Township. He served with Merck and Company; NJ State Parole Board; NJ Assembly Majority Office; and Middlesex County Office of the Prosecutor



Father Doctor Luke Istananous, MD, is an assistant professor of the Psychiatry Voluntary Faculty at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School. He completed his residency training in 2004 at Rutgers NJMS and remained an attending psychiatrist until 2010. He felt called to become a priest in the Coptic Orthodox Church and later founded and medically directed St. Luke's Behavioral Community and Health Services, a Christian faith-based psychiatric outpatient and independent nonprofit organization located in Belleville, NJ. The facility offers services to the public free of charge and is self-funded by private donors. Father Istananous recognizes the best standard of care includes all aspects of the individual, the bio-psycho-socio-spiritual.



Rashi Aggarwal, MD, is a professor, the residency program director, and a C-L psychiatrist in the Department of Psychiatry at Rutgers NJMS. Her residency was at Maimonides Medical Center and her fellowship, in Consultation-Liaison psychiatry, was at Mount Sinai Hospital in New York. She has dedicated her passion for teaching and advocacy to increasing awareness about physician wellbeing. She is a deputy editor for Academic Psychiatry. She currently serves on the APA's Council on Medical Education and Lifelong Learning and is the program chair for AADPRT's annual meeting in 2024.



John "Calvin" Chatlos, MD, is an associate professor in the Department of Psychiatry at Rutgers-RJMS, medical director of the Ambulatory Withdrawal Management Program and the outpatient Specialized Addiction Treatment Services Program. He completed his internship at Johns Hopkins Hospital, his psychiatry residency at Bellevue-NYU, and his fellowship in Child & Adolescent psychiatry at Columbia University. He authored chapters on adolescent dual diagnosis in the first ASAM textbook and multiple book chapters on adolescent substance abuse. His work with 12 Step programs has led to exploring the nature of spiritual experience.



Celena Ma, MD, is a psychiatry resident at Rutgers NJMS. She attended college at Tufts University and medical school at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School. Her current areas of interest include emergency psychiatry, consultation-liaison psychiatry, and working with the adolescent population.
